Survey on Juvenile Offender Services

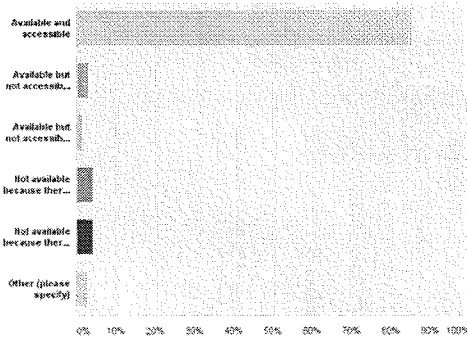
- 28 of 30 the Juvenile Community Corrections Agencies had one or more staff member respond
- Surveys completed between January 10th and 20th, 2017





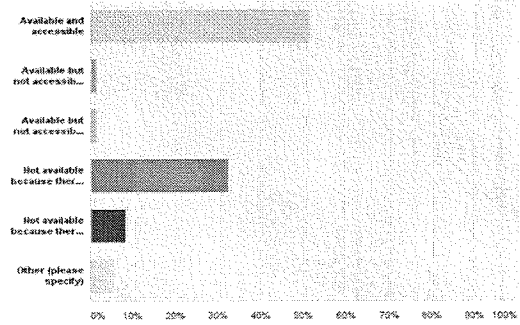
Q10 In your district, substance abuse treatment services are:

Answered: 25 Skipped: 1



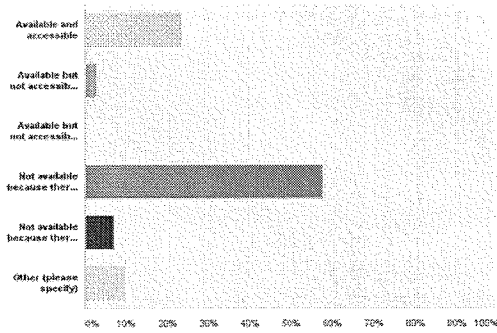
Q11 In your district, Thinking for Change or another Cognitive Behavior Therapy(CBT) model is:

Answered: 24 Skipped: 7



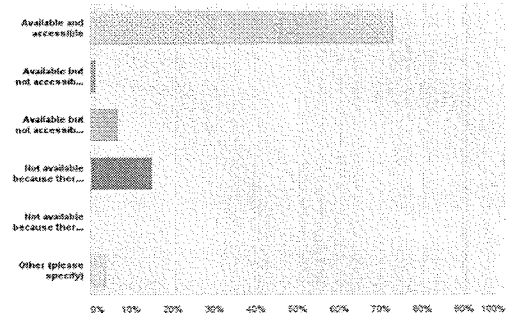
Q12 In your district, Youth Advocacy Program (YAP) is:

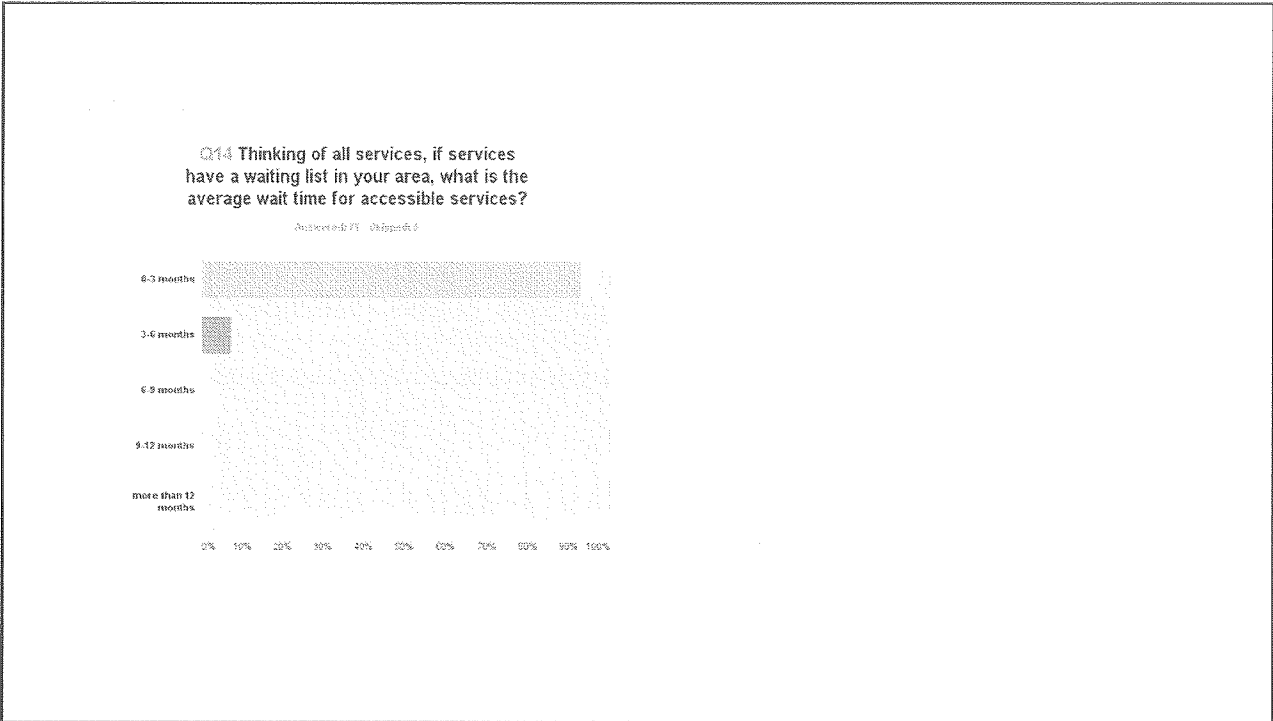

What Other Services are Needed District but are not Available?

- 44 narrative responses received, some identified multiple needs.
- Common themes include: transportation assistance, substance abuse treatment, educational services for suspended youth, CBT, FFT, MST, ART
- Quotes:
 - Several clients are struggling with just an elementary education as they are long termed and when their year is over the school finds everything they can to long term them within a few weeks next time.
 - Services that families can AFFORD.
 - If all of those (in the survey) were available that would be sufficient.

- 30 narrative responses received
- Common themes: transportation challenges, access challenges due to location and times services provided, additional training, seek to deliver services within the agency so less dependent upon referrals to other sources
- Quotes
 - Too many schools in our area don't want to work with kids that are on probation, are quick to suspend them, and they want us to "lock the kid up".
 - Training needs to be for all persons engaged with well-being of youth.

Juvenile Corrections Advisory Boards

First Annual Report on Programs Needed

Juvenile Corrections Advisory Board (JCAB) Report

- Section 16 of SB367 created new requirements to submit a report by October 1 of each year detailing the costs of programs needed in the judicial district the JCAB represents to reduce the out-of-home placement of juvenile offenders and improve the rate of recidivism of juvenile offenders in the district
- KDOC-JS sought input from the Community Advisory Committee (CAC) to develop this new process and provided guidance materials to JCAB Chairpersons and Administrative Contacts on August 23, 2016
- Reports received from 28 of 30 JCABS. Extensions beyond October 1st were given whenever requested to accommodate local meeting schedules and need for additional time

Programs

- 153 total programs identified:
 - 57 could not project a cost or number of youth to be served for the program
 - 10 additional programs defined a non juvenile justice population to be served (ex. Child Welfare)
 - * Note: 48 includes those programs who propose to serve mixed population of juvenile offenders and other target population
- Of the 86 providing information on cost and number of juvenile offender youth
 - Total annual cost of \$7,056,667
 - Serve annually 7,708 youth
- 53 of which are currently being implemented or piloted as the same program requested (ex. FFT) or comparable program (ex. MRT instead of T4C)
 - FFT Statewide begin February 2017 N = 9
 - MRT Statewide projected by July 2017 N = 23
 - IIP: Statewide by July 2017 N = 5
 - ART: began pilots in 18th and 29th as of August 2016 N = 9
 - YAP Piloting in 7th, 10th, 11th, 21st, 29th as of January 2017 N = 4
 - OWDS – Existing KDOC training curriculum N = 3
 - Sex Offender Assessment and Treatment Statewide as of July 2016
 - MST Pilot in 10th and 29th as of August 2016
