The Sedgwick County Project

- Youth & families participating in family preservation services
- Court Order M.D.T.
- Identification at time of FP referral
 - JIAC
 - KS Dept. for Children and families
 - Saint Francis Ministries

Identified staff at each agency: DOC, DCF COMCARE, & St.FM

- System Navigator Role Saint Francis Ministries
 - Identification
 - Coordination of staffings
 - 30 Day follow up meetings
 - In person
 - E-mail/electronic
 - Data Collection
- Monthly oversight committee meetings

- Identification
 - Family engages FP and a recent JIAC intake event
 - Current FP participant with subsequent JIAC intake
- MDT staffing with youth and family present
 - Staffing model established and followed with time guidelines
 - Recommendations for youth and family based on RNR identified at JIAC intake
 - Follow up in 30 days

The Sedgwick County Project

- Dates of the project: 8/1/17 to 3/31/18
- Completed on 1/31/19 (9 months after the last staffing)
- 45 youth/43 families identified as eligible for the CYPM
- 27 youth/25 families completed CYPM staffings
- Data submitted on 2/28/19

Lessons Learned

- Stable living environment for youth is key
- Immediate crisis level intervention
- "Just another meeting" is not helpful
- CYPM is data intensive
- Dedicated staff at each agency is essential
- Importance of learning about partners
- Plans follow youth as they move through the systems and are shared with the court

Lessons Learned

- Integrated data sharing early in the dually involved process - dashboard
- Budget consideration for dedicated personnel and training time.
- Oversight Meetings monthly allow for real problem-solving in real time.
- Ongoing stakeholder trainings for continuity and sustainability
- State level support is necessary for long term sustainability
