	Intensive Parenting Program	\$ 180,000.00	30	For parents/guardians of at-risk kids, emphasis on reducing antisocial and behavior problems in children.
	School Programming			Ages 10-17, experiencing issues associated with attendance, behavior, suspensions and/or expulsions.
	Mentoring Program			Ages 10-17 who have limited access to formal mentoring by positive role models. For youth not eligible for YAP.
	Phoenix Connection - Intensive Outpatient MH			Structured group therapy for ages 10-18 who exhibit psychiatric symptoms and significant impairment in day to day education, social and interpersonal functioning. Intermediate level of care, serving as a bridge between inpatient hospitalization or PRTF and a traditional office outpatient setting.
	Predictive Analytics Modeling	\$ 50,000.00		Leveraging criminal justice and health/human service records in a shared data exchange will help JoCo obtain a realistic assessment of its current capacity to effectively serve this population, identify which agencies we should be collaborating with, and enable us to connect youth and their families to the right resource at the right time.
	Respite/Crisis Intervention Beds			Juvenile Offenders whose family and/or MH situation is such that release to home is not an option but the youth is not appropriate for detention or PRTF. Alternative to detention.

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	Juvenile Workforce Development Planning	\$ 38,945.00	48	Ages 15-21 who lack necessary skills to secure and maintain FT employment. Areas of concentration may include education, social skills, life skills, soft skills, career assessments, applications, interviewing and/or job-specific training.
	Re-engagement Officer	\$ 86,825.38	110	Youth on community supervision who have stopped attending school, reporting for supervision or who are otherwise in jeopardy of having a warrant or motion filed to revoke. Re-engagement efforts to be attempted in lieu of further court involvement or detention.
	Education Advocate	\$ 75,000.00		Educational rights specialist contracted to work with youth and their families to protect educational rights of students at risk of being suspended or expelled from school. Work to develop mIEP or 504 plans with the goal of keeping youth in school in lieu of long term suspension or expulsion.
	Financial Assistance for Services	\$ 128,000.00		Financial assistance/voucher funds for clients to obtain services that would otherwise be cost prohibitive or create financial strain on the family. May include SA evals/treatment, MH evals/treatment, UA testing. While this is not a validated EB practice, timely intervention in these areas is needed.
